Multi-state Outbreak of Hepatitis A

As of June 17, 2013, the CDC is investigating acute hepatitis A illnesses in 118 people in eight states: Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, and Washington.

Hepatitis A linked to a frozen berry mix sold by Costco. Costco has removed Townsend Farms Organic Antioxidant Blend frozen berry mix from its shelves and Townsend has recalled the product. Hepatitis A is a liver disease usually caused when a person ingests fecal matter from contact with objects, food or drink. CDC's announcement is **here**.

The purpose of this observance is to highlight the importance of immunizations, one of the top 10 public health accomplishments of the 20th Century. The toolkit is designed to help public information officers and immunization program managers work together to communicate about the importance of immunizations during August. Investigations are being done to figure out the source of MERS-CoV and how it spreads. The World Health Organization is urging health workers around the world to be on the alert for symptoms of the deadly Middle East respiratory syndrome coronavirus (MERS), which has the potential to circle the globe and cause a pandemic.

So far, there are no reports of anyone in the U.S. getting infected with MERS-CoV.

The HealthMap Vaccine Finder

HealthMap Vaccine Finder http://flushot.healthmap.org is a free, online service where users can search for locations offering flu and other adult vaccines. They work with partners such as clinics, pharmacies, and health departments to provide accurate and up-to-date information about receiving the flu vaccine and they have recently added information on finding 10 additional adult vaccines. Their goal is to make flu vaccination available to everyone by simplifying the process of choosing and finding a vaccine provider. In addition to locating vaccine services, users can track disease outbreaks and will find instructions on how to install Vaccine Finder widget on your website.

http://www.immunize.org/resources/apps.asp. The most recent app (currently only for Apple iPhone and iPad) is from The American Congress of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG). It includes a highly interactive immunization applet that lets physicians and patients learn about different vaccinations and determine the need for vaccines based on age, conditions, and special circumstances. The applet also includes information specific to immunization and pregnancy, frequently asked questions, alerts on immunization updates, regulations, and a list of resources.

The Immunization Action Coalition (IAC) is a national organization that works to increase immunization rates and prevent disease by creating and distributing educational materials for health professionals and the public that enhance the delivery of safe and effective immunization services. CDC Travel Update

The CDC has updated it's travel website with pages for clinicians and travelers. Destination pages provide information on specific countries, including recommended vaccines and information about the relevant diseases. Travelers and clinicians can also select special populations to receive additional information about, including children and those who are immune compromised. As you know, there is always the potential for international travelers to bring home more than the usual 'souvenirs' from their overseas adventures. Travelers who are unprotected from vaccine preventable diseases, can and do return to the United States and unwittingly spread disease. There are several major outbreaks of vaccine preventable diseases including rubella (Japan) and measles (Wales, Middle East). For example, so far this year, a total of 5,442 rubella cases have been reported through the rubella surveillance system in Japan, with 77% of cases occurring among adult males. (The MMWR article below provides updated information.) The VICNetwork encourages ongoing messages about making sure travelers are up to date on their routine vaccinations before they leave the country.

Immunization Strategies: Using the Evidence and What Works to Improve Practice

In an effort to promote best practices in improving vaccination rates, Public Health Foundation (PHF) provides the **Public Health Works: Immunization Strategies: Using the Evidence and What Works to Improve Practice**, a free on-demand training program. This training will benefit all State, Tribal, Local, And Territorial health department staff, health care personnel, and other public health professionals by demonstrating how the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health and their community partners are using recommendations outlined in The Guide to Community Preventive Services and quality improvement techniques to improve immunization rates.
